un-

When **un-** is added to the start of a root word, it changes its meaning to the opposite of the original word. This is because **un-** usually means 'not'.

For example:

well means the opposite of **unwell**.

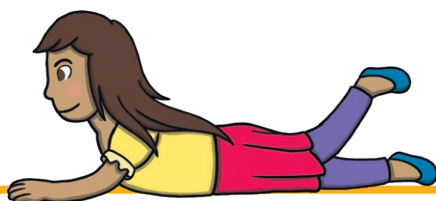
